Assembly speaker reminds students to foster unity

High school is a launching pad for entering the world in a positive way, according to Liberty High School's assembly speaker Samantha Wilson.

The associate vice president for Student Life at Southern Wesleyan University was the guest speaker for the assembly. The gathering recognized Black History Month.

Wilson told the students that people who are discounted or rejected often come together to make a difference in the world.

"Rejection has historically had a way of unifying people," she said. Wilson cited civil rights icon Rosa Parks, who refused to give up her bus seat to a white man.

"She truly rocked this nation during her life," Wilson said. "She was unassuming – a quiet riot, I would call her."

Parks' impact on the world was profound and, perhaps unanticipated, Wilson said.

University breaks ground for

Plans for a new chapel and fine arts center are being fine-tuned at Southern Wesleyan University in Central.

The campus and community gathered at Folger Fine Arts Auditorium on April 10 and ended the ceremony on the site of the new facility on Wesleyan Drive. The new building will be called the Faith Newton Hobson Chapel, in honor of a Southern Wesleyan University graduate. Hobson grew up near the university and has numerous personal and family ties to the institution. "This new building will be a significant asset to the university and to our community. In addition to providing quality resources for our music programs, the facility will also provide a new resource for community events," said Dr. David Spittal, president of Southern Wesleyan University.

The new chapel and fine arts center will provide seating for 1,200 in its main auditorium and will be used for student chapel programs, university and community concerts and other larger gatherings, such as community and conference events. The three-story facility will also house offices for the university chaplain, fine arts faculty and support staff, in addition to music studios, practice rooms and rehearsal halls for the university's growing fine arts department.

Construction on the new building is scheduled to be completed in August of 2008.

The new 47,000-square-foot building is part of the university's master plan for expansion and has been designed to accommodate growth in university enrollment and to provide expanded

space for community programs on the campus, Spittal said.

The funding for the \$5 million facility has been provided through contributions by alumni and friends of the university's Building Foundations for a New Generation capital campaign project.

"I am deeply grateful to those who have given so generously to this project," Spittal said. "The encouragement and financial support of our trustees, faculty, staff, alumni and friends have made this day possible."

In addition to the chapel and fine arts project, the university master plan and capital campaign include the construction of a new university physical education and wellness center designed to host 2,500 spectators for athletic and community events. The wellness center will include an indoor running track, training facilities, coaching offices, locker rooms and teaching classrooms. The wellness facility will serve the community, providing a community resource for larger public events. The schedule for the funding and completion of the wellness facility will be announced by the university when plans are finalized.

Lady Warriors capture national championship

For the first time in the institution's history, Southern Wesleyan University can boast about being national champions.

On March 9, the SWU Lady Warrior basketball team defeated Central Christian College in a 77-73 victory to win the National Christian College Athletic Association women's championship in Oakland, Ind.

Entering the tournament as the top seeded team, the Lady Warriors were granted a bye the first round of play and went on to defeat Bethany Lutheran College 79-63 in the second round. The Lady Warriors managed to maintain a lead for the majority of the championship game before defeating Central Christian in the final seconds.

During the championship game, sophomore Keunna Thomas led the team in scoring with 16 points. Two SWU freshmen also scored in double digits. Amanda Chrisley scored 15 points and Chinessia Lee added 11. Junior Sara Vollmer and Senior Savannah Parnell scored 10 points each.

"I think the national championship gives the program a sense of stability and accomplishment," said head coach Chris Williams. "It also gives the team and the entire school a sense of pride."

Williams was also honored during the tournament by being named NCCAA National Coach of the Year.



SWU announces new athletic director, new coach

Chris Williams, SWU associate athletic director and varsity women's basketball coach, has been named as the university's athletic director, according to Dr. David Spittal, president of Southern Wesleyan University.

Williams succeeds Dr. Keith Connor, who has served in the position of athletic director since 1969. Williams was hired by the university in 2004 and most recently coached its women's basketball team to a NCCAA National Championship. He earned his bachelor's degree in social work and a master's degree in management from Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, N.Y.

"Chris has demonstrated excellent coaching skills and effective leadership in his current assignment. We anticipate a great future for SWU athletics and are looking forward to working with him in this new assignment," Spittal said. Dr. Keith Connor will continue to serve as professor of physical education and program coordinator in physical education. In this capacity, he will provide leadership

to advance and expand the physical education program of the university and its accreditation.

"We are deeply appreciative of Dr. Connor's 36 years of leadership as a faculty member and athletic director. He has provided a foundation for the continued growth of the university's athletic program and will continue to serve as a valued and outstanding member of the university faculty," Dr. Spittal said.

The university is pleased to announce the appointment of LaCheryl Smith as varsity women's basketball coach for the 2007-2008 year, replacing Williams. Smith is a 1996 graduate of Southern Wesleyan University in elementary education and, as a student, was a member of the university's women's basketball team.

SWU students create Pocket - Sized Computer

The ultimate convenience in today's information age is the ability to carry personal data from place to place in a single, compact data source.

In an attempt to make this a reality, two Southern Wesleyan University students, under the guidance of a computer science professor, spent a year researching options. Lance Ingle of Piedmont and Sam Stack of Kernersville, N.C., worked with Dr. Paul Jordan, professor of computer science. Both students are majoring in applied computer science.

The students compiled a computer operating system for a thumb drive, complete with user data and usable applications. In March, the group presented findings from their research project. Their goal was to easily transport an operating system, data files and applications from one computer to another.

The group received a research grant from South Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities. Their project is called the Simplified Linux Automated Desktop project, or SLAD.

As one moves from business computer systems, to labs, to home: files and settings are different and can create complications for users," Jordan said. A solution to the challenge is to compact the information, settings, an operating system and programs all onto a single, portable thumb drive that runs independently of the installed desktop operating system, he said.

"The project uses a flavor of the Linux operating system along with a Windows front end to bring the users' personal data and applications to a single thumb drive," said Dr. Paul Jordan, professor of computer science. "After a year of research, the goals were accomplished and the final product has more to offer than originally intended."

Through the SLAD Project, the group took convenience to a different level.

"Personal data and applications were compacted into a single, affordable device," Jordan said. "The complexity of the Linux operating system and the simplicity of the SLAD front-end allow the automated desktop to bring a convenient experience to each of its users.

"This was good for Southern Wesleyan University and for the computer science department. Sam and Lance represented SWU and most of all, Jesus Christ, well," Jordan said.

Some old-timers will remember the old flagpole, which stood directly in front of Grimes Hall, the former allpurpose building on campus.
